





VOCATIONAL TRAINING IN THE SPOTLIGHT: OPENING PRESS CONFERENCE WORLDSKILLS LEIPZIG 2013

Leipzig, 2 July 2013: At WorldSkills Leipzig 2013, more than 1,000 participants from 53 countries and regions are competing in 46 events. These disciplines represent over 150 different vocational careers on the German job market.

During the opening press conference, Prof. Dr. Johanna Wanka, Federal Minister for Education and Research, highlighted the significance of vocational training for the German economy: "In the international comparison especially, it is becoming more and more apparent what an important foundation dual education actually is." For the first time, WorldSkills Leipzig 2013 will see a political world forum for dual vocational training. "A Europe-wide alliance for vocational training is the key to decreasing youth unemployment and can serve as a shining example for other countries."

The alliance is an initiative by the European Union with the goal of improving the quality and scope of vocational training in Europe.

Androulla Vassiliou, EU Commissioner for Education, Culture and Youth, explained how her visit to WorldSkills London two years ago opened her eyes. "The greatest challenge in Europe today is youth unemployment. We need to encourage young people to seize opportunities and take their futures into their own hands." The EU Commissioner also emphasized the importance of cooperation. "This alliance and these partnerships are essential for the Europe of today."

On a related note, Dr. Theodor Niehaus, President of WorldSkills Leipzig 2013, argued for a stronger focus on vocational training: "We don't need Germany's

































next super singer – we have a highly motivated and committed youth. They are a strong pillar for development in the region, the country and throughout Europe." In addition, he mentioned that there could be no blueprint for vocational training. Though, as he explained, many different forms of vocational training exist in Germany, "we are the ones to consolidate them and create a platform for exchange and networking."

Simon Bartley, President of WorldSkills International, described WorldSkills as a movement whose goal it is to cultivate vocational training and celebrate its excellence. "We do this partly through the Competitions, but this is only a fraction", said Bartley. He elucidated how every country has its own qualifying competitions. "All 1,004 participants from 53 countries and regions want to prove that they are the best of the best. Unknowingly, they already are. We should celebrate each and every one of them because they are the future of their countries and of the world."

Sven Morlok, Deputy Minister of Saxony and State Minister for Economy, Employment and Transportation, underscored the impact of WorldSkills Leipzig 2013 in the public domain: "Our Saxon university education is the forge for engineers in Germany. At WorldSkills, we want to show the potential of a qualified vocational education. Especially today, in this fast-moving world where content is constantly changing, broad training is vital. It is our insurance against youth unemployment."

Under the patronage of the German Federal Chancellor Dr. Angela Merkel, WorldSkills Leipzig 2013 will take place at the Leipzig trade fair, July 2-7. At the Competition, more than 1000 skilled youth up to the age of 22 from all over the globe compete for the world title.
